Annual
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Le mot de la directrice

Une année comme 2023, marquée par de profondes tensions géopolitiques, par l'urgence des enjeux globaux et la pression générée sur l'arène multilatérale, ne peut que souligner la pertinence et l'importance d'un Institut comme le nôtre – des talents, de la recherche et de l'expertise que nous produisons.

La réforme du master interdisciplinaire, lancée il y a deux ans dans une démarche de co-construction avec les enseignant-es et les étudiant-es, avait pour but d'adapter l'un des programmes phares de l'Institut aux transformations de notre monde en anticipant sur les enjeux que représentent les nouvelles données de la paix (et de la guerre), les tensions autour de la diplomatie transnationale et la nécessaire transformation du multilatéralisme, l'impératif de la durabilité (intégrant la dimension environnementale et sociale), les nouvelles technologies et leurs défis sociaux, économiques, démocratiques, politiques et de gouvernance. Le succès de notre nouveau master interdisciplinaire en études internationales et du développement ne se dément pas. Tout en adaptant le programme sur le fond, nous avons aussi renforcé son aspect professionnalisant. Il répond aujourd'hui aux attentes d'étudiant-es tourné-es principalement vers une carrière professionnelle en combinant un cursus académique rigoureux avec l'acquisition de *soft skills* transversales, indispensables quel que soit le secteur professionnel visé par nos étudiant-es, et en offrant une expérience d'immersion professionnelle innovante à travers les séminaires de recherche appliquée ou « Applied Research Projects » (ARPs).

Dans une dynamique d'assurance qualité essentielle, l'année 2023 a vu la finalisation de notre accréditation institutionnelle. Ce label national, qui est réévalué tous les sept ans, signale des normes de qualité et d'excellence élevées permettant le financement fédéral.

Par ailleurs, notre recherche s'adapte et se transforme en résonance avec l'évolution du monde et de ses enjeux. Cette année encore, nous avons recruté dix professeur-es et chargé-es d'enseignement et de recherche dont les sujets de recherche et d'enseignement sont en prise avec ces enjeux. La pertinence de notre recherche, son indépendance et sa haute qualité peuvent se mesurer par le succès que nous rencontrons dans les processus de financement compétitif. Le revenu moyen généré par ce biais est passé de 3,5 millions de francs suisses en 2009-2011 à 10,5 millions en 2019 et 16 millions en 2023.

Pour ce qui concerne nos centres de recherche, deux évolutions sont à noter. D'une part, le Réseau sur les politiques et la coopération internationales en éducation et en formation (NORRAG), qui était jusqu'alors un programme associé de l'Institut, a été intégré comme un centre de recherche à part entière; l'importance de l'éducation face aux enjeux du moment n'est certainement plus à démontrer. En parallèle, l'Institut a eu l'honneur d'inaugurer une Chaire UNESCO en politiques éducatives comparées, créée pour renforcer la recherche politique, globale et comparative, dans le domaine de l'éducation avec le but particulier d'amplifier les voix et de

promouvoir les expériences des pays du Sud. La professeure Gita Steiner-Khamsi, directrice académique du NORRAG de 2017 à 2022, est la première titulaire de la chaire. Chanwoong Baek, récemment recruté comme professeur assistant au Département de relations internationales et de science politique, est l'actuel directeur académique de NORRAG et cotitulaire de la chaire. D'autre part, le Tech Hub s'est imposé rapidement en 2023 comme un centre de recherche et d'expertise clé sur la question des enjeux sociaux, économiques, politiques et de gouvernance associés aux nouvelles technologies. Le Tech Hub a un positionnement transversal et travaille en étroite collaboration avec nos autres centres de recherche.

L'année 2023 a aussi été marquée par le lancement du *Geneva Policy Outlook*, en partenariat avec la République et canton de Genève, la Ville de Genève et la Fondation pour Genève. Cette initiative importante matérialise le rôle central que peut et doit jouer l'Institut à Genève et en particulier au cœur de la Genève internationale. L'objectif du *Geneva Policy Outlook* est d'encourager une dynamique d'apprentissage mutuel, de collaboration et de co-construction à Genève et au-delà pour faire face aux enjeux qui questionnent la gouvernance mondiale. Dans une approche à la fois prospective et pragmatique, l'idée est de mieux comprendre ce qui se joue afin de poser les bases d'une adaptation, voire d'une transformation des institutions, et notamment de l'écosystème de Genève.

Du côté de la formation continue, 2023 a marqué les dix ans du LLM en droit international, qui attire près d'une trentaine d'étudiant-es chaque année. Au cours de la dernière décennie, ce programme de l'Institut a été régulièrement classé parmi les cinq meilleurs programmes LLM en droit international dans le monde. La formation continue a également inauguré un Executive Diploma in Diplomacy, Negotiation and Policy, réaffirmant ce faisant le rôle historique de l'Institut dans la formation diplomatique et en particulier la formation en diplomatie multilatérale tout en intégrant les nouvelles dynamiques qui transforment actuellement le monde diplomatique.

Depuis ses origines, l'Institut a pour vocation de créer des opportunités pour des jeunes de toutes les régions du monde en les dotant des compétences, de l'assurance et du sens des responsabilités nécessaires pour agir positivement sur les problématiques complexes du moment, que ce soit au niveau global et multilatéral, régional ou national. Dans ce dessein, il est important que nous puissions nous doter des moyens financiers nécessaires pour accompagner des jeunes provenant de régions défavorisées. En 2023, nous nous sommes associés avec l'Association Arghosha Faraway Schools pour soutenir l'éducation de femmes afghanes au moyen de bourses leur permettant de rejoindre l'un de nos programmes de master. Grâce à ces bourses, ces étudiantes confrontées à des restrictions majeures d'accès à l'éducation vont pouvoir poursuivre des études universitaires de qualité qui leur ouvriront les portes d'une carrière professionnelle, diplomatique ou académique.

Cette année encore, l'Institut a organisé et accueilli de nombreux événements et activités de forum, ouverts à un très large public et en général enregistrés pour permettre un accès au-delà des contraintes de temps et de lieu. Notre corps étudiant, riche de sa diversité et d'un futur qui lui appartient, est un acteur de plus en plus mobilisé pour ces échanges et ces activités de forum. Parmi les événements les plus notables en 2023, nous avons eu le plaisir d'accueillir le président de la Confédération Alain Berset pour une conférence sur « Quel rôle pour la Suisse dans un monde en crise ? ». Filippo Grandi, haut commissaire des Nations Unies pour les réfugiés, a délivré cette année la Kofi Annan Peace Address dans le cadre de la Peace Week. Ghassan Salamé, professeur émérite de relations internationales à Sciences Po Paris, ancien ministre de la Culture du Liban et ancien représentant spécial auprès du Secrétaire général des Nations Unies en Libye, a prononcé la conférence d'ouverture de l'année académique autour du thème « War and Peace in the 21st Century ». 2023 a aussi marqué les dix ans du Geneva Challenge, créé en 2014 grâce à la vision et à la générosité de l'ambassadeur Jenö Staehelin et au patronage de Kofi Annan, alumnus de notre Institut. Ce concours vise à mobiliser des équipes d'étudiant-es du monde entier autour d'enjeux liés aux objectifs de développement durable dans une démarche de proposition de solutions innovantes et pragmatiques. Le thème pour 2023 était « La solitude ».

À travers ses différentes activités, l'Institut mobilise l'excellence scientifique et la transdisciplinarité pour encourager la pensée critique et une approche systémique avec une vision claire : favoriser la compréhension et l'engagement essentiels à un monde de paix, équitable et durable. Par la formation de nouvelles générations engagées et responsables, par sa recherche d'excellence aux frontières des enjeux du jour et par son activité d'expertise et d'accompagnement des décideurs et décideuses, l'Institut contribue toujours plus activement à la réflexion et à l'action sur les enjeux globaux et le multilatéralisme du futur. Plus que jamais, dans le monde tel qu'il est, notre mission est importante !

L'Institut de hautes études internationales et du développement

The Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies

L'Institut de hautes études internationales et du développement est un établissement universitaire de recherche et d'enseignement postgrade, spécialisé dans l'étude des affaires mondiales, au croisement des relations internationales, des questions de développement et des grands enjeux contemporains.

L'Institut a été accrédité en 2009 par le gouvernement suisse et est inscrit depuis 2012 dans la législation cantonale comme l'une des hautes écoles soutenues par l'État de Genève.

Installé au cœur de la Genève internationale, l'Institut offre des programmes d'études disciplinaires et interdisciplinaires au niveau du master et du doctorat. Il produit une recherche à la fois fondamentale et appliquée sur les principales thématiques du monde international contemporain. Il a également pour vocation d'offrir une expertise ainsi que des programmes de formation et d'être une plateforme de débat et de dialogue à l'intention des actrices et acteurs internationaux, en particulier celles et ceux qui déploient leurs activités dans les secteurs suivants :

- la coopération internationale, qu'il s'agisse d'administrations nationales à rayon d'action international (ministères des affaires étrangères, du commerce, de l'économie, de la santé, banques centrales, etc.), d'organisations intergouvernementales ou encore d'organisations non gouvernementales ;
- les affaires internationales, notamment les entreprises multinationales, le secteur financier, les cabinets d'avocats, les sociétés de conseil et de relations publiques ;
- l'enseignement et la recherche universitaire, les think tanks, les fondations internationales, les médias, etc.

The Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies is an institution of research and higher education dedicated to the study of world affairs, with a particular emphasis on the crosscutting fields of international relations, development issues, and contemporary global challenges.

The Institute was accredited in 2009 by the Swiss government and has been enshrined in cantonal legislation since 2012 as one of the institutions of higher education supported by the State of Geneva, along with the University of Geneva.

Situated in the heart of International Geneva, the Institute offers disciplinary and interdisciplinary master and PhD programmes. It produces both fundamental and applied research focusing on today's major international issues. It also provides expertise and training programmes, and is a platform for debate and dialogue for international actors from the following fields in particular:

- international cooperation, including national administrations working on international issues (ministries of foreign affairs, trade, economy, health, central banks, etc.), intergovernmental as well as non-governmental organisations
- international business (notably multinational companies), the finance sector, law firms, consulting and public relations agencies
- university-level teaching and research, think tanks, international foundations, the media, etc.

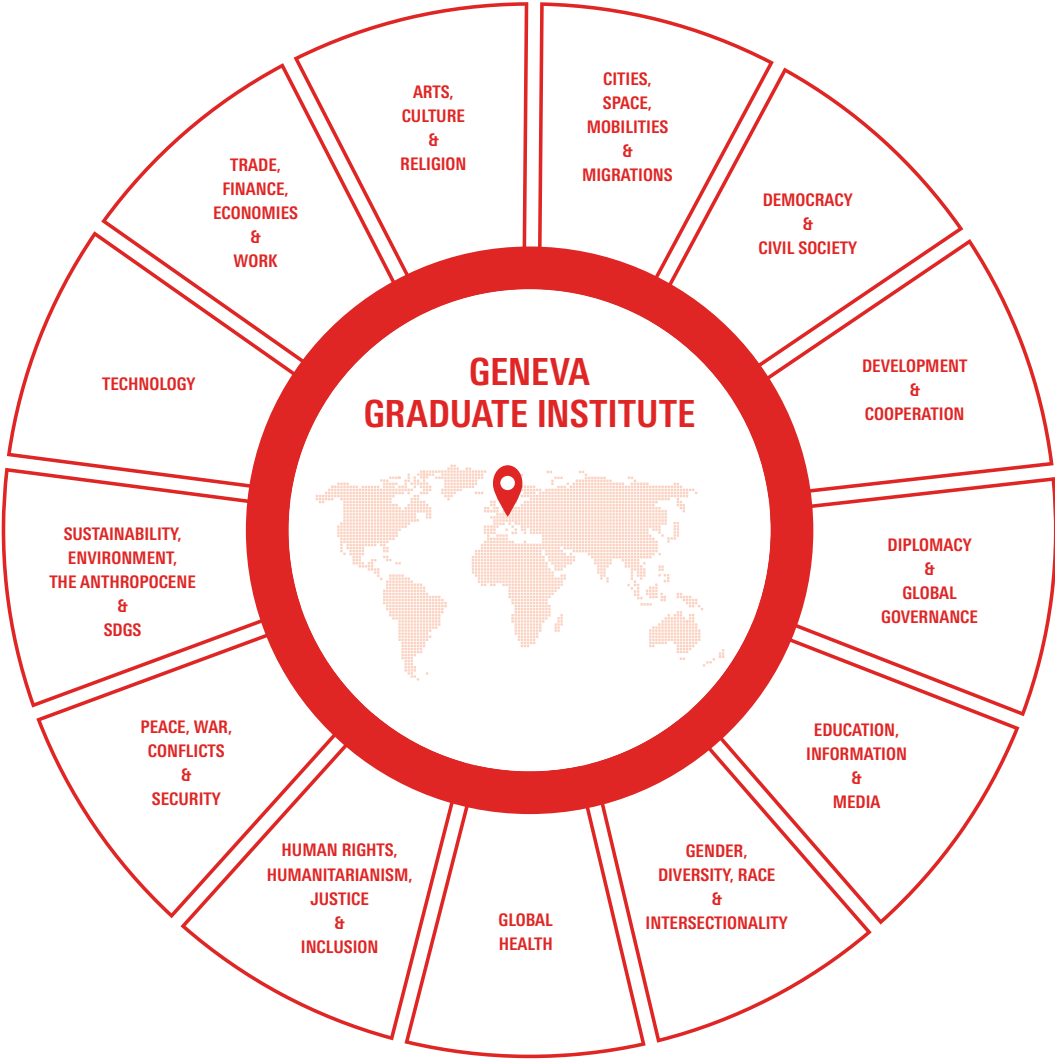

L’Institut et la Suisse

L’Institut bénéficie depuis des décennies du soutien de l’État de Genève et de la Confédération suisse en raison de sa contribution :

- à la formation de talents suisses et internationaux ;
- à la production scientifique dans ses domaines de spécialisation ;
- au rayonnement international de Genève ;
- aux relations extérieures de la Suisse.

Ce soutien de longue durée s’explique par la coïncidence des identités et des intérêts. Les activités de l’Institut s’accordent parfaitement avec l’« esprit de Genève », nourri de la mémoire de l’exil huguenot, du rôle de capitale humanitaire après la création du Comité international de la Croix-Rouge, et de la tradition d’accueil d’organisations internationales et de gouvernements depuis l’établissement de la Société des Nations. Après la guerre froide, Genève est également devenue une plaque tournante dynamique pour la diplomatie privée, consciente d’un ensemble diversifié d’acteurs influençant les affaires internationales.

Avec la politique extérieure de la Suisse, l’Institut partage des orientations fondamentales : la primauté du droit, notamment du droit humanitaire et des droits humains ; l’importance de la coopération internationale et de l’aide au développement ; et, de manière générale, la nécessité d’un monde ouvert et libre où la collaboration internationale est un mécanisme crucial. En valorisant le respect de la diversité

et la recherche de solutions pragmatiques, l’Institut s’inscrit, en outre, dans une culture politique qui est caractéristique de la Suisse et représente l’un des meilleurs apports de ce pays à la pratique des relations internationales.

Au-delà de son expertise sur les thématiques-clés de la Genève internationale, l’Institut contribue directement aux relations extérieures de la Suisse par l’action de ses anciennes étudiantes et étudiants au sein de l’administration fédérale (Département fédéral des affaires étrangères, Secrétariat d’État à l’économie, Banque nationale suisse, etc.), mais aussi dans les organisations internationales à Genève ou ailleurs, et par la réalisation d’un nombre substantiel de contrats de recherche appliquée. La qualité de ses ressources et de son réseau fait de l’Institut un interlocuteur académique bien équipé pour servir la Genève internationale et soutenir la position de la Suisse :

- en formant les futurs acteurs et actrices de l’action internationale et de la collaboration multilatérale ;
- en fournissant à la communauté internationale une expertise utile à la formulation et à la mise en œuvre de politiques publiques internationales ;
- en offrant un perfectionnement professionnel à un large éventail de personnes actives dans l’arène internationale ;
- en jouant le rôle de plateforme de dialogue et de concertation entre acteurs internationaux de tous types, en particulier pour accélérer l’adaptation de la Genève internationale en tant que plaque tournante mondiale dans un monde en évolution rapide.



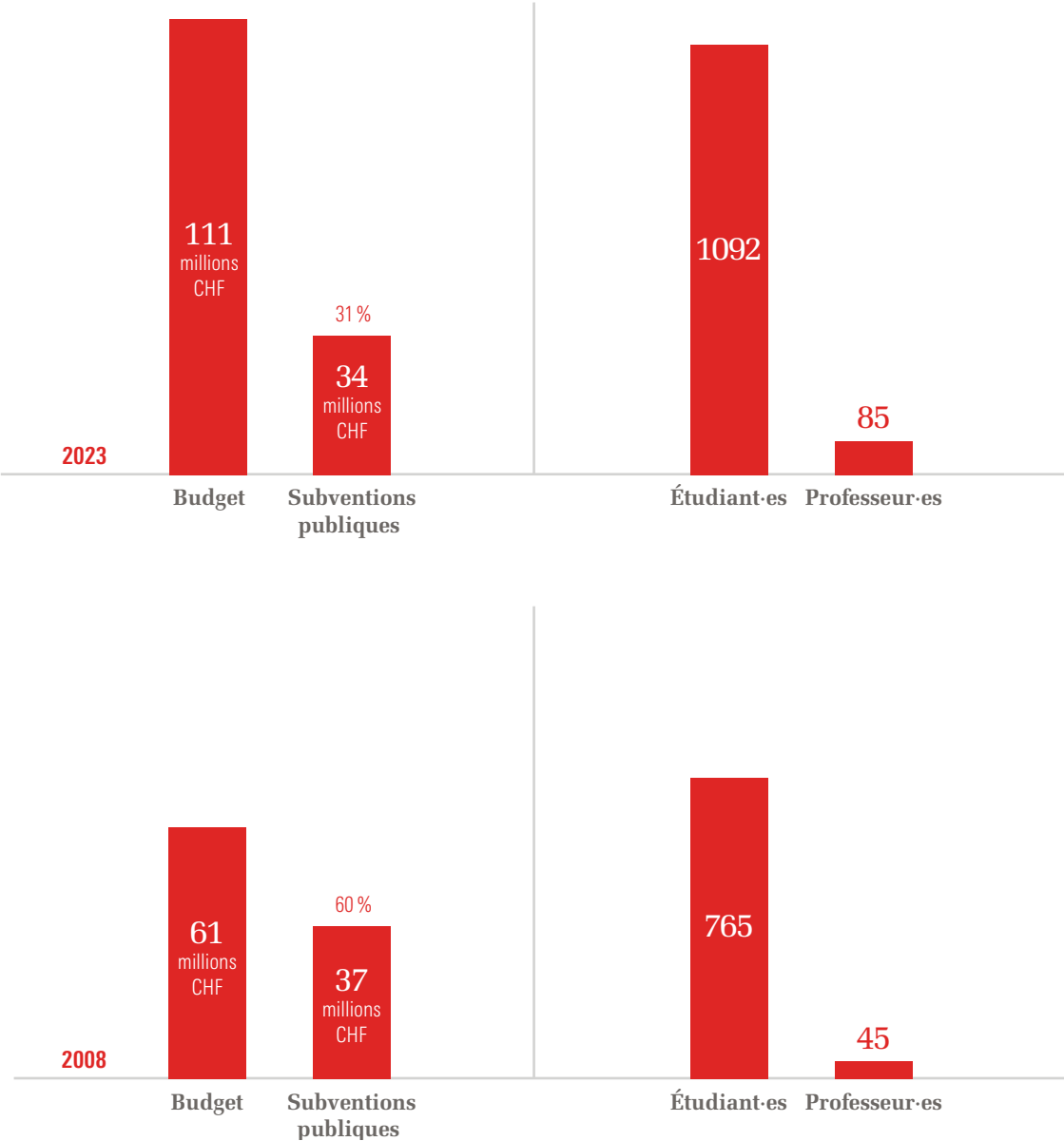
Une institution entrepreneuriale An Entrepreneurial Institution

Trois initiatives stratégiques Three Target Initiatives

Les trois initiatives stratégiques de l'Institut sont l'Initiative diversité, équité et inclusion, l'Initiative soutenabilité et l'Initiative arts et culture.

S'appuyant sur la vision et les principes de la Charte de l'Institut, elles ont pour objectif d'inscrire et de déployer les thématiques qu'elles portent dans tous les domaines et aspects de l'Institut – à la fois comme questions de recherche et objets pédagogiques et d'enseignement, mais aussi comme projets d'engagement dans notre vie quotidienne, à Genève et dans le monde.

Ces initiatives comprennent des représentants et représentantes de toutes les parties prenantes internes : corps enseignant et étudiant, centres de recherche concernés, administration et direction. Leur dynamique principale est d'entraîner et d'encourager de manière large les projets autour de ces thématiques portés par les différentes parties constituantes de la communauté de l'Institut.

L'Initiative diversité, équité et inclusion et l'Initiative soutenabilité proposent un plan stratégique pluriannuel, se donnent des objectifs à court terme motivants et relativement faciles à mettre en œuvre parallèlement à des objectifs à long terme plus ambitieux, mesurent la progression et l'impact sur les objectifs donnés, préparent un rapport annuel et assurent la communication autour de leurs réalisations.

The Institute's three target initiatives include the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Initiative, the Sustainability Initiative, and the Arts and Culture Initiative.

Building on the vision and principles of the Charter, they aim to inscribe and deploy the themes they address in all areas and aspects of the Institute – both as research questions and teaching and learning objects, but also as projects for engagement in our daily lives, in Geneva and globally.

These initiatives include representatives of all internal stakeholders: faculty and students, relevant research centres, administration, and direction. Their main dynamic is to drive and encourage broad-based projects around these themes by the different constituents of the Institute's community.

The Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Initiative and the Sustainability Initiative propose a multi-annual strategic plan, set motivating and relatively easy-to-implement short-term objectives alongside more ambitious long-term objectives, measure progress and impact on the given objectives, prepare an annual report, and communicate their achievements.

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Initiative

DIVERSITY MONTH

Every November, the Institute celebrates Diversity Month, taking a deeper look into its different facets. What is diversity? What does it mean to the individual? What does it mean for the collective? How is it constructed? How diversity is viewed and understood is, in itself, diverse, and the Institute likes to consider what it means for different members of the community.

In 2023, our awareness month was part of a larger, year-long campaign dedicated to respect. To celebrate the diversity of our community here at the Institute, we gathered five words key to achieving respect: consideration, inclusion, kindness, tolerance, and empathy.

Various events were held at the Institute as part of Diversity Month, including a roundtable on diversity at the Institute and "Multitude", an art exhibition by the painter and socio-economist Marie Thorndahl.

CAMPAGNE CONTRE LES VIOLENCES SEXISTES ET SEXUELLES

À l'occasion de la Journée internationale pour l'élimination des violences sexistes et sexuelles, le 25 novembre 2023, l'Institut s'est associé à une campagne « pour en finir avec les violences sexistes et sexuelles » organisée par le Canton et la Ville de Genève, des associations féministes et différents partenaires institutionnels.

Cette campagne conjointe, qui a eu lieu du 6 au 26 novembre 2023, avait pour objectif de sensibiliser le grand public, former le corps professionnel et accompagner les victimes de violence. Elle s'est matérialisée par une campagne d'affichage et divers événements (expositions, conférences, ateliers et actions symboliques) durant le mois de novembre. Un nouveau site internet a également été lancé, avec de nombreuses ressources sur la problématique.

CAMPAGNE DE SENSIBILISATION SUR LE HARCÈLEMENT

Par son code de conduite, l'Institut s'engage à préserver un environnement de travail et d'apprentissage stimulant qui favorise la liberté et l'excellence académiques, l'équité, l'intégrité, la diversité et le respect mutuel. Dans ce contexte, l'Institut s'est inspiré d'une formation existante de l'EPFL pour préparer un module de formation en ligne destiné à aider les membres de sa communauté à gérer les situations difficiles conformément aux dispositions du code de conduite. Tous les membres ont été tenus de le suivre afin de mieux comprendre comment gérer les situations d'intimidation, de harcèlement, de discrimination, de racisme ou tout autre comportement inapproprié, que ce soit en tant que victime ou en tant que témoin. Ce module fournit également des informations importantes sur les services de soutien de l'Institut et sur les lois suisses pertinentes.

RESPECT CAMPAIGN: STICK WITH RESPECT AND CHOOSE YOUR STICKER!

In collaboration with the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Initiative, the Institute launched the second phase of its Respect campaign. To this end, the Institute created five stickers, in English and French, with one of five words chosen following the communitywide brainstorming session of words affiliated with "respect": consideration, inclusion, kindness, tolerance and empathy. The Institute is devoted to cultivating an environment of inclusion, consideration, tolerance, empathy and kindness for all. We can be better together!

À l'initiative de 2050Today, le forum d'action climatique de Genève, l'Institut a signé avec 38 autres institutions internationales la Charte 2050Today afin de s'engager à mettre en œuvre un plan d'action pour réduire ses émissions de gaz à effet de serre et s'associer aux efforts engagés par la Ville et l'État de Genève. Cette charte a été adoptée dans le cadre de la deuxième réunion de 2050Today qui s'est tenue le 5 décembre 2023 au Palais Eynard en présence des représentant-es de la Ville de Genève, de l'État de Genève, de la Confédération suisse, de l'Université de Genève et des Services Industriels de Genève.

La charte recommande de transformer en mode durable les activités de chaque institution dans les domaines de l'énergie, du bâtiment, de la mobilité, de l'alimentation, de la biodiversité, du numérique responsable et de la gestion des déchets. Offrant un guide pratique de décarbonation, elle prescrit pour chaque secteur des objectifs spécifiques d'intervention et répertorie plus de 300 actions concrètes à entreprendre avec des échéances à 2025, 2028 et 2030. En souscrivant à la charte, les institutions bénéficieront d'un soutien coordonné leur offrant des ressources en matière de conseil et de monitoring.

SUSTAINABILITY WEEK: STUDENTS RAISE AWARENESS ON ENVIRONMENTAL CHALLENGES

Every spring, students in 15 cities across Switzerland organise their respective Sustainability Week, which aims to make sustainability a focal point of Swiss higher education institutions. Master students from the Graduate Institute Student Association's Environmental Committee organise and promote Sustainability Week Geneva events, in coordination with the University of Geneva, to ensure that engagement in sustainability remains a core subject at the Institute and beyond.

Discussing the importance of Sustainability Week, Camille Darbo and Yannic Bucher, master students and organising members of the Environmental Committee, said, "First and foremost, our main goal is to sensitise students to the ecological and climate emergencies we are facing. Climate change can be quite an overwhelming topic and it is often difficult to find an entry point for people who are not familiar with the issue." The 2023 week, held on 20–24 March, was centred around sustainable food, with workshops around diet, seasonality and food waste, waste management with a visit to a waste management facility in Satigny, and a clothing repair workshop, aimed at giving participants new skills to make outfits last longer and counter fast fashion.

THE GENEVA GRADUATE INSTITUTE SIGNS A SUSTAINABLE IT CHARTER

As a major emitter of greenhouse gases, digital technology is a major contributor to climate change. This is why the Geneva Graduate Institute has committed to a more sober digital future, in particular through the Sustainability Initiative, the IT department, and more recently, the Tech Hub. In May 2023, the Institute signed the Sustainable IT Charter developed by the *Institut du numérique responsable* (INR). This commitment is part of the Institute's Digital Sobriety action plan, which was presented in autumn 2023. The five-point Charter has already been signed by 443 organisations in France, Belgium, and Switzerland. The commitments made by the signatories relate to the environment as well as to accessibility, ethics, transparency, and the emergence of new behaviours and values.

HEALTH AND WELLBEING WEEK

Mental and physical health are the essence of human wellbeing, whether at work or in our personal lives. In the spirit of cultivating wellbeing throughout the Geneva Graduate Institute community, the Wellbeing and Support team organised the Institute's first Health and Wellbeing Week on 24–28 April 2023. The week consisted of organised activities and workshops around yoga, swimming, healthy cooking, and themes such as "Expression, Connection and Well-being", "The Wisdom of Our Nervous System" and "Communication with Impact". The week received much support and will return in 2024.

Alumnae·i Reunion

The 10th annual Alumnae·i Reunion took place on Saturday 16 September 2023 at the Maison de la paix and at the Hôtel Beau-Rivage.

Laure Waridel, Laurence Boisson de Chazournes, Jacques Grinevald, Cleopatra Doumbia-Henry, Maria Teresa Infante Caffi, Maurice Kamga and Nilly Sikorsky, all profiled in the "Inspiring Stories" launched to mark the Institute's 100th anniversary in 2027, honoured us with their presence. The same goes for the families of Michel Kafando and the late Nobuyuki Idei. They all received the Lifetime Professional Achievement Award, which recognises an alumnae·i who has demonstrated excellence and achievement in their distinguished career; has demonstrated leadership in their profession; has made a positive contribution to the prestige, influence and reputation of the Institute; and exercises a strong positive influence within the community.

■ To honour the outstanding achievements of the Institute's alumnae·i, the Alumnae·i Association Committee created four Alumnae·i Awards in 2016: Alumna/Alumnus of the Year; Young Alumna/Alumnus; Commitment to the Institute and Alumnae·i Association; Lifetime Professional Achievement. Three new awards were created in 2021: Arts and Culture; Diversity, Equity and Inclusion; Peace and Sustainability. Not all awards are given every year. Laureates are selected by members of the Committee by vote and are invited to attend the awards ceremony and gala dinner of the Alumnae·i Reunion in Geneva.

First-Ever Platform for the Alumnae·i Community Launched!

The Alumnae·i Office launched the Geneva Graduate Institute Alumnae·i portal. This is *the* place to connect with our 24,000-strong international member network (including Executive Education alumnae·i). Alumnae·i can use this custom tool to exchange, support, discover, and find out more about the different people who have passed through the doors of our unique institution. And maybe even find an old friend or make new ones.

With this tool, alumnae·i community members can now:

- Maintain a lifetime email address that redirects to the email of their choice

- Consult job board and publish their own offers
- Access feeds from the whole community

Amrutha Somasekharan Nair Receives the 2023–2024 Alumnae-i Community Scholarship

Coming from rural India where accessing healthcare services is a real struggle, Amrutha Somasekharan Nair pursued first an alternative system of medicine (ayurveda) for her undergraduate, during which she organised screening camps, outreach services and awareness sessions for the most marginalised communities in South India.

Further, she pursued a Master's in Health Administration, where she learned about the social science perspective of health and research. For her thesis, she explored how people make treatment choices and what factors influence them. Amrutha started her career with an NGO largely focusing on improving primary healthcare access in rural India, where she facilitated programme implementations and research. After two years, she joined IPE Global, an international development sector organisation which works in the socio-economic and environmental space to achieve sustainable development goals. Her experience with different population groups nudged her into the necessity of expert skills and interdisciplinary understanding to implement a broad-lens approach while working towards inclusive development. Hence, she decided to pursue the Interdisciplinary Master's programme at the Geneva Graduate Institute.

The Master in International and Development Studies (MINT) stands out to Amrutha because of its comprehensive course curriculum involving global issues and perspectives, statistical

literacy, research and specialisation. The course will give her an in-depth understanding of how global health issues affect, and are affected by, geopolitics, political economy and other epistemological and regulatory regimes. This will strengthen her knowledge of global health issues and complement her academic training and work experience in India's development space. Further, the MINT programme will improve her leadership skills and empower her to pursue a career in global health.

Amrutha wants to work with international organisations in Geneva and contribute to global efforts to reduce disparities and promote inclusive development where people can contribute to and benefit from economic growth, thereby achieving the Sustainable Development Goals.

The Institute's Accreditation

In Switzerland, universities must undergo an institutional accreditation process in order to maintain high standards, receive federal funding, and ensure the ongoing pursuit of excellence. This process evaluates the quality assurance systems of educational institutions.

Quality assurance encompasses all internal mechanisms, procedures and regulations which allow a university to assess and ensure its level of quality.

Since 2020, the Institute has been engaged in its second accreditation procedure. On 5 October 2023, the Institute was fully accredited until the next cycle, commencing in 2027.

Launch of the *Geneva Policy Outlook*

On 31 January 2023, the Geneva Graduate Institute launched the *Geneva Policy Outlook*, a new digital publication produced in partnership with the Swiss Confederation, the Republic and State of Geneva, the City of Geneva, and the Fondation pour Genève.

In her introduction, Director Marie-Laure Salles said, “We have today in Geneva an exceptional opportunity – in fact *opportunity* is not the right word, *duty* is more like it. We have the duty to make use of the unique density of experiences, expertise and knowledge that is present right here, around us, and to come together and actively shape the debate on the future we want.”

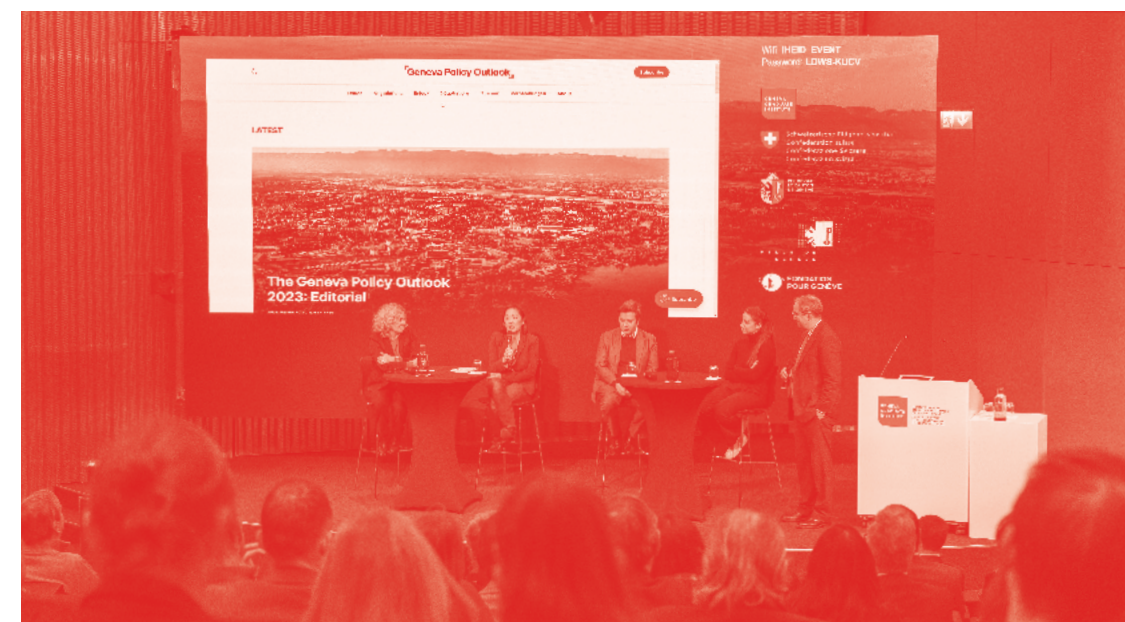
In an age of radical uncertainty, it is more important than ever to adopt an anticipatory logic about the implications of rapid change for policymaking. The *Geneva Policy Outlook* is a finger on the pulse of Geneva's global policy space and looks at

upcoming strategic and operational trends relevant for professionals working on global affairs in Geneva and beyond. It asks how global governance needs to adapt to new world orders, what this means for International Geneva, and what can be done now, and by whom to achieve this objective.

Achim Wennmann, Director for Strategic Partnerships at the Institute and Editor of the *Geneva Policy Outlook*, explained that “our aim is to shape a narrative that goes beyond ‘business as usual’”, underlining that International Geneva will need a great deal of courage to change if it wants to remain a relevant global governance hub in the future.

The contributions to the *Geneva Policy Outlook* draw on informal exchanges of a community of senior strategic thinkers and practitioners and on the expertise and global networks of the Institute.

The Foundation Board expresses its warmest thanks to her for the work she has accomplished since her arrival and looks forward to the continued collaboration for the future development of the Institute. The Board wishes Marie-Laure Salles and the Direction every success in the challenges and projects ahead.

Marie-Laure Salles will continue the implementation and consolidation of her strategic plan around several strong axes: continuously improving teaching and research by strengthening

scientific excellence, transdisciplinarity and transthematicity, as well as critical thinking, in order to prepare students and professionals for the many challenges of a world in transition; increasing the Institute's capacity for innovation and agility in all its missions, in order to face the radical uncertainty of a world in polycrises; and, in a complex economic and geopolitical context, ensuring the stability and financial resilience of the Institute so that it can look to the future with confidence.

The Institute's UNESCO Chair in Comparative Education Policy

On 21 February 2023, the Geneva Graduate Institute inaugurated the UNESCO Chair in Comparative Education Policy, created to strengthen policy research in education with the vision of amplifying the voices and promoting knowledge from the Global South.

Professor Gita Steiner-Khamsi, the 2017–2022 Academic Director of the Network for International Policies and Cooperation in Education and Training (NORRAG), serves as the first Chair holder. Professor Chanwoong Baek, NORRAG's current Academic Director and faculty member in the International Relations/Political Science Department, was appointed as the Co-Chair.

Of its creation, Professor Steiner-Khamsi says, "The main purpose of the chair programme is to strengthen policy research in education in ways that help surface, amplify and disseminate expertise and scholarship from the Global South. The designation of the chair programme is in studies of comparative

education policy. More often than not, reforms in education, or in other sectors for that matter, are designed in the Global North and then catapulted to the Global South. National experts are then reduced to local adapters and implementers of these imported reforms. We attempt to tackle this asymmetry."

As to the actions she plans to take as Chair, Professor Steiner-Khamsi says, "Drawing on UNESCO's unique position, the chair programme focuses on policy brokerage, that is, promotes the use of research evidence for policy decisions. We will actively support scholars from the Global South to communicate their research effectively by preparing knowledge products in diverse formats and disseminating them through various channels, including video and social media. NORRAG brings substantive experience in this area and serves as an honest broker that bridges research and policy, the local and the global, and the producers and users of knowledge."



Establishment of the Maria Rosario Lazzati Niada Scholarship for Afghan Women

In order to support the education of Afghan women, the Association Arghosha Faraway Schools and the Geneva Graduate Institute have partnered to offer scholarships to Afghan women admitted to a two-year master programme at the Institute. These scholarships are awarded without distinction of ethnic origin or religion. Currently in Afghanistan, women face strong restrictions to higher education. A master's degree could mean access to an academic or diplomatic career, a job in international and non-governmental organisations, or in international corporate companies. The master programmes at the Institute aim to broaden the reach of Afghan women's university education abroad, giving them a competitive advantage in the global community. An event in presence of Filippo Grandi, UN High Commissioner for Refugees, was organised on 24 May 2023 at the Geneva Graduate Institute to launch this scholarship programme.



The Kathryn and Shelby Cullom Davis Library Celebrates Its 10th Anniversary

On 9 September 2013, the Maison de la paix was inaugurated in the heart of International Geneva. Designed by Swiss firm IPAS and its architect Eric Ott, the building's original and ambitious "petal" shape, adapted to the chosen site, has impressed visitors. At its heart is the Kathryn and Shelby Cullom Davis Library, named after a student couple who were both doctoral candidates in the 1930s.

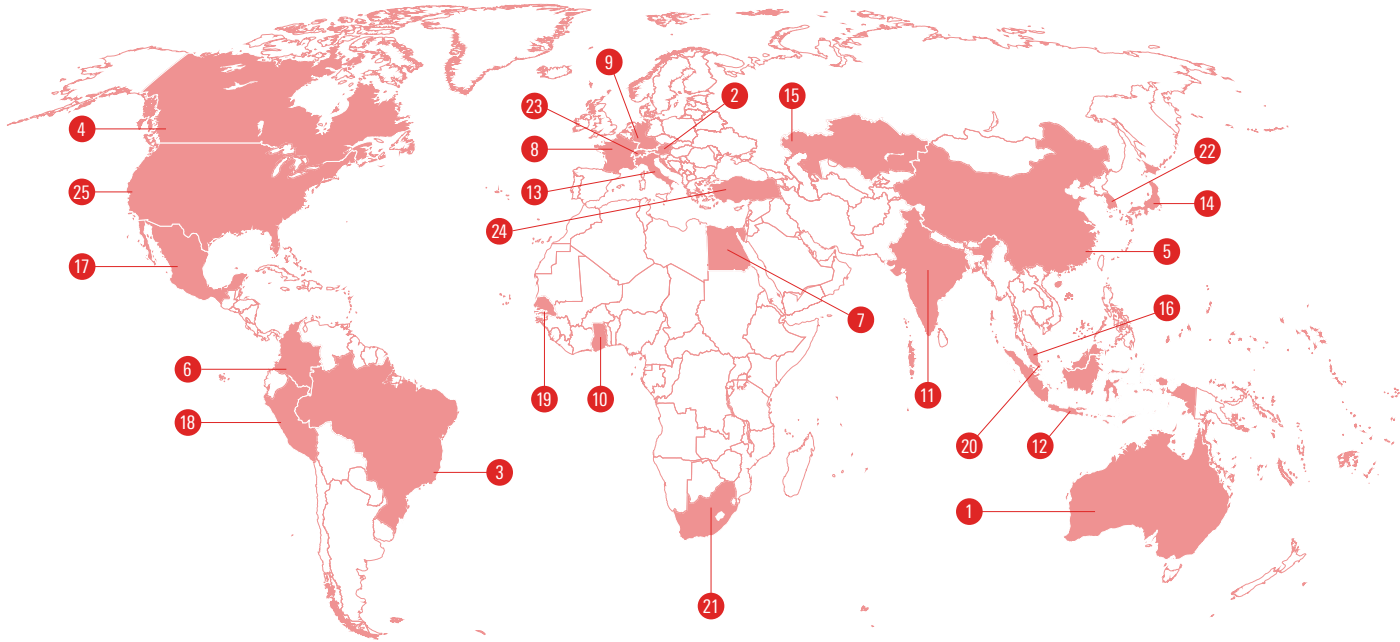
An internationalist at heart and mind, Kathryn Davis was exceptional in the support she gave to higher education open to the world. The Institute greatly benefited from her engagement and generosity. In 2007, she decided to contribute to the construction of the Maison de la paix with a donation of USD 10 million for the library, which bears her name and that of her husband. She also financed several doctoral scholarships. Finally, she included the Graduate Institute in her group of American universities participating in the "100 Projects for Peace", which she created on the occasion of her 100th birthday.

Specialised in the field of international relations and development studies, the Library offers valuable collections that reflect the disciplines taught at the Geneva Graduate Institute (Anthropology and Sociology, International Economics, International History and Politics, International Law, International Relations and Political Science) and the research areas (democracy, education, finance, gender, governance, health, migration, trade, etc.).

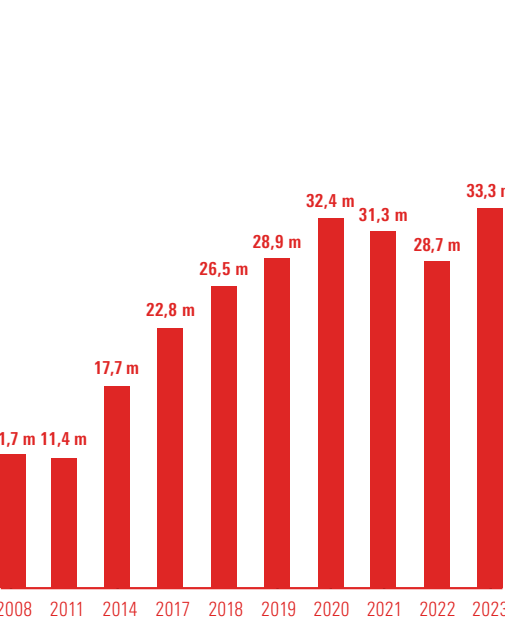

Strengthening Study Programmes and Student Services

Since it was founded in 1927, the Institute has been a higher education institution offering postgraduate programmes that attract the best students from all over the world. The academic offering comprises the Interdisciplinary Master's programme in International and Development Studies (MINT) and 11 disciplinary master's and doctoral programmes (in Anthropology and Sociology, International Law, International Economics, Development Economics [doctorate only], International History and Politics, and International Relations/Political Science). These high-level courses enable students to question, analyse and put into perspective the global issues that concern the future leaders of a rapidly changing world. Topics covered include diplomacy, peace, conflict, global governance, sustainability, health, gender, finance and trade, new technologies, artificial intelligence, etc. Regularly revised, the study plans are based on an innovative teaching approach that enables students to consolidate their knowledge, learn about research methodologies, exercise their critical thinking skills and acquire cross-disciplinary competencies.

As part of its ongoing commitment to continuous improvement, in 2022 the Direction decided to undertake a reform of the doctoral and interdisciplinary master's programmes. This was carried out in collaboration with professors and students, and led to an in-depth rethinking of objectives, course content, teaching formats and curriculum structure. In this respect, 2023 has been a period of stabilisation and assessment to measure the impact of the changes and student satisfaction. In particular, the doctoral reform includes the creation of a four-year package combining grants and teaching assistantships, which has made it possible to recruit students with solid and very promising research projects within or outside an institutional project, provide them with guaranteed funding and increase their employability. Overall, the reformed programmes have become more competitive and stand out from their competitors thanks to their originality and modularity.

The Institute values the richness and diversity of its student community and is constantly striving to improve its support for students from a wide range of backgrounds and who may have special needs. For example, in 2023, in line with the values set out in the Institute's Charter, a strategic plan entitled DisAbilities has been launched to implement a policy for the inclusion of students with disabilities. Similarly, the campus has been equipped with spaces for social interaction and emulation, enabling students to meet, exchange ideas, debate and learn together. Student Services has also made it a priority for its

staff to provide quality service and caring support in the event of difficulties. These approaches enable students to flourish both inside and outside the classroom and strengthen their sense of belonging to a community.

The Institute has established academic partnerships with 53 leading universities and schools, giving students the opportunity to spend a semester abroad under attractive conditions. In 2023, two new agreements have been signed with Emlyon Business School (France) and Beijing Foreign Studies University (China), completing a network that spans all continents. The Institute has also strengthened its range of programmes with partner institutions in order to diversify academic opportunities and build up recruitment channels. The short programmes – Undergraduate Semester Programmes and Summer Programmes – enable foreign students at bachelor level to benefit from the teaching of a postgraduate institution (on key themes such as security, humanitarian aid, the UN system, digitalisation) and at the same time introduce them to International Geneva.

Master in International and Development Studies (MINT)

The 2022–2023 academic year marked a challenging transition for the MINT programme. The last pre-reform cohort graduated in September, and the programme had to meet the needs of second and first-year students simultaneously. This required considerable logistical, administrative, budgetary and academic efforts. Despite these challenges, there was increased student interest in the programme, and an excellent yield rate for the 2023–2024 academic year. This was very encouraging and provided further stimulus for improving the programme, including enlarging and strengthening the Applied Research Projects (ARPs), increasing the number of research electives, and increasing the offer of transversal themes and specialisations.

In particular, ARPs underwent substantial changes, with 14 faculty leads replacing PhD student tutors to enhance project supervision. With around 75 yearly projects, ARPs remain a distinctive component of the MINT programme. Efforts were made to facilitate and support the work of the 14 colleagues

in charge of the supervision of the projects. ARPs guidelines, accommodating special needs and optimising teamwork, were established. Also, research electives were expanded to foster interdisciplinary collaboration among faculty, thus underscoring the Institute’s commitment to interdisciplinarity.

Significant reforms in the 2023–2024 curriculum included reducing credits for the compulsory “Global Issues and Perspectives” course and transitioning to a pass/fail system for this particular course.

Future plans entail collaborating with HEAD (Geneva University of Art and Design) and EPFL (Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Lausanne) to broaden seminar offerings in complementary disciplines such as arts, design and hard sciences, co-teaching seminars, strengthening specialisations, addressing recruitment challenges, with further objectives to enhance communication, reform master theses, and emphasise diplomacy and geopolitics leading up to the Institute’s centenary in 2027.

AI and ChatGPT: The Challenges for Teaching and Research

Since its creation in 1927, the Geneva Graduate Institute has reflected upon the changes in the contemporary world, whether they be ideological, political, social, cultural, economic or technological. Digital technology and the gradual “datafication” of society over the last few decades are no exception, as they are changing the way we live, produce, and think. In the age of surveillance capitalism, the vast amount of data collected on platforms has accelerated the development of various forms of artificial intelligence (AI). Students, researchers and professors must question this phenomenon even though it may fascinate, frighten or be disconcerting.

AI should neither be demonised nor rejected outright, but integrated, with a critical eye, into the educational approaches, methods, practices and theories that structure our collective intelligence. In November 2022, the company OpenAI launched a chat agent using AI (ChatGPT), which is stirring up public debate, and is sometimes praised, sometimes condemned. The academic world is inevitably affected by the implementation of these

AI tools, as ChatGPT disrupts teaching and research through its functionalities. Some universities and schools have chosen to ban the use of ChatGPT because its improper use would lead to plagiarism and intellectual fraud.

Our Institute has not chosen this restrictive path, which can only be considered to be unrealistic, as the tool and its environment are evolving and adapting rapidly. This does not mean that everything should be allowed, but rather that the use of AI should be considered as one of several tools that should feed a reflective and investigative approach. This is why the Director of the Institute, Marie-Laure Salles, has formed a working group whose task is to conduct a strategic review; monitor and lead debates on the subject; adapt our teaching methods; and propose an awareness and training programme for our community.

Interview with Claudia Seymour, Head of Applied Research Projects and Practice

You are Head of the Applied Research Projects in the Interdisciplinary Programme. What is the purpose of ARPs and why are they important?

ARPs are a foundational component of the MINT programme. They involve small student groups working together in their first year of studies to conduct policy-relevant research with partner organisations on issues relating to international development and international relations. Through ARPs, students learn and apply analytical and research skills to practical and policy-relevant issues in international relations and development. Teamwork, collaboration, professionalism, effective communication, and problem solving are crucial skills that the ARP process intends to teach and reinforce, to prepare students to take up management and leadership roles in their future careers.

What types of projects do the students work on and what types of partners do they collaborate with?

This year will mark the fourteenth year of applied research projects. To date, there have been hundreds of successful research partnerships between organisations and our students. Projects are usually interdisciplinary in nature, and address questions that students are also questioning in the classroom – from peace and security, to trade and finance, to environment and sustainability, and including perspectives on human rights, gender and inclusion, migration, and global health.

While most partner organisations are based in Geneva, in most cases, the scope of the commissioned ARP research is global, used to support policies and programming with global relevance. Partners might include international organisations, non-governmental organisations, foundations, governments, think-tanks, start-ups, cultural bodies, and private sector actors. ARPs thrive through partnerships from across sectors, as true impact for global problems requires a broad diversity of actors working together.

What is the added value for our students?

The ARPs provide a unique opportunity to our students to stretch beyond their intellectual and theoretical comfort zones. Through the ARPs, students will apply theories and concepts learnt in the classroom to real-world reality, which can be a hard

and often frustrating growth process for students as they learn about meaningful global engagement. One of the most challenging aspects of the ARPs is working in groups, as students are confronted with differences in working styles, communication approaches, and ways of dealing with interpersonal conflict. This learning is often deeply personal, usually offering students the most insightful learning opportunities about themselves and others, which is invaluable life learning.

What do you see for the future of these projects and which collaborations would you like to develop?

Each year, we receive ever-larger numbers of partner applications, making the partner selection process ever-more competitive. This is a lucky position to be in, and we are doing our best from the Institute's perspective to ensure the highest quality of student research contributions for the partner organisations who have trusted us with their questions. While we plan to continue established research collaborations, we also welcome more collaborations with actors who will help us to bridge the research-policy divide. This includes actors from the private sector, the arts, science, and technology. We are fully aware that if we are serious about solving our most urgent concerns and realising the tremendous potential of our times, it will take all of us, working together.

Institute Hosts 2023 Geneva Debate with Oxford Union and the British Embassy in Berne

On 15 March 2023, the Geneva Debate hosted the Oxford Union to debate in favour of or against the motion: "The house supports ecocide prevention as a principle in international humanitarian law." The Debate with Oxford Union is a collaboration with the Great British "Brain Off" initiative of the British Embassy in Berne. According to the British Ambassador to Switzerland and Liechtenstein, James Squire, "the 'GREAT Brain Offs', featuring selected United Kingdom and Swiss universities, are designed to encourage bilateral exchange, amplify young voices on this issue, and develop a fresh and motivated group of stakeholders to 'See Things Differently'". Climate change and biodiversity loss are important international priorities for the UK.

PhD candidate at the Institute, Ryan Mitra is President of the Debate and shares the priority that was at the centre of the debate: "Environmental disasters and the climate crisis are the fundamental issues of our times. The current generations and the generations to come will live in hotter, more mercurial,

and more volatile conditions [...]. The question of ecocide prevention is fundamental to updating our structures to be suited for these times. However, it is important not to look at it solely as a solution. In parallel to solutions, equity and accountability are critically important to navigate what lies ahead. Now, all of this seems very easy to illustrate and demand on paper, but they are contentious exercises that require time, energy, patience and deliberation. This debate and the issues it will engage on, I hope, make up a small (but fundamental) experience in shaping these exercises."

Institute Students Win Big at 2023 Global Model WHO

From 10 to 19 February 2023, three Interdisciplinary Master students specialising in Global Health participated in the first Global Model WHO, a global, authentic, student-led simulation of the World Health Organization's (WHO) World Health Assembly (WHA). Two students were awarded Diplomacy Awards, one an honorable mention, and as a whole, the Geneva Graduate Institute team earned the Delegation Award as the Best Small University Delegation.

Zhiye Yang, Erika Shinabargar and Ryan Abraham served as model delegates from WHO member states, and discussed the future path for achieving Universal Health Coverage worldwide. "This Model WHA was a stage for us, the 'global health crew', as we nicknamed ourselves, to shine, and to put what we learned in class into practice", explained Zhiye Yang, who won a Diplomacy Award for her work as delegate from the

Kingdom of Thailand. "The Institute offered us the opportunity to participate as a delegation and fully prepared us long before the actual Model WHA began."

The theme for the conference was directing universal health coverage towards primary healthcare. Together, all the delegates representing different countries drafted a resolution related to this topic.

At the end of the conference, the students came away with skills in the art of negotiation and compromise between states, teambuilding, and exposure to the process of the World Health Assembly.

The Global Model WHO was organised by the World Federation of United Nations Associations (WFUNA) in collaboration with WHO and took place virtually.

Sustaining Excellence in Research

The Geneva Graduate Institute's research mission is to produce knowledge that fosters a better understanding of the contemporary world in its multifaceted complexity. As a community of scholars in the academy, the Institute is committed to advancing debate on global issues in the social sciences, law and history, political science and economics. As a community of publicly engaged scholars, the Institute also seeks to enrich policy debates at the international and local level by bringing the results of independent research to the forefront.

Producing high quality and independent research is of central importance to the Institute as, in today's highly competitive global academic market, it allows the Institute to attract outstanding students, researchers and faculty members. Excellence in research, indeed, is a key factor not only in hiring and promoting faculty members but also in attracting leading researchers through competitive external grants, who contribute to sustain the Institute's intellectual hedge and whose projects finance a pool of talented doctoral and postdoctoral researchers standing at the forefront of innovative research.

The Institute's efforts to promote and invest in the quality of research, notably through the award of seed money to its junior faculty members and the creation of an effective Research Office, is reflected in the steady rise of research revenues over the past decade. While the average revenue generated by competitive research funding amounted to CHF 3.5 million in 2009–2011, it rose to an average of CHF 6.8 million for the period 2012–2015, to reach CHF 10.5 million in 2019 and 16 million in 2023.

These results attest to the relevance of the topics being researched at the Institute, with over 75% of research projects aligning closely with one or several of the Institution's four strategic priority areas: peace, conflict and security; global governance, diplomacy and multilateralism; sustainability in its varied expressions (environmental, social and political); and the impact of new technologies and their regulation.

To sustain this dynamic of excellence and independent critical thinking in research, the Institute has engaged since 2021 in a comprehensive reform process, promoting intellectual exchange between projects and initiatives at the intersection of its research centres' core fields of expertise. This ongoing process is articulated along four axes: (1) the strengthening of research ethics and integrity through the adoption of new guidelines and policies; (2) improved governance mechanisms for the research centres; (3) enhanced transthematic synergies and interdisciplinary collaboration between the centres to generate policy-relevant outcomes for International Geneva and beyond; (4) the leveraging of administrative sources to enhance exchange and efficiency. To this purpose, the centres are now all located on the same floor of the Maison de la paix, contributing to form a vibrant laboratory of international public policies – the factory of peace.

Research at the Institute

La recherche est effectuée par des professeur-es soit à titre individuel, soit dans le cadre de centres interdisciplinaires. Ces centres forment un milieu intellectuel stimulant, en favorisant l'échange entre le corps professoral et les doctorant-es et en renforçant des réseaux d'expertise spécialisés dans les thématiques où Genève et la Suisse ont un avantage comparé. Ils offrent une interface unique entre le monde académique et la communauté internationale grâce à leur palette d'activités qui vont de la recherche et de l'expertise à l'organisation de débats, en passant par l'accueil de chercheurs et chercheuses du monde entier et la contribution aux programmes de formation continue de l'Institut.

Research is conducted by professors either on an individual basis or in conjunction with interdisciplinary centres. These centres provide a stimulating intellectual environment by promoting exchanges between professors and doctoral students and by strengthening expertise networks in subjects where Geneva and Switzerland have a comparative advantage. They provide a unique interface between the academic world and the international community thanks to their wide range of activities, including research and expertise, organising public debates, hosting researchers from around the world and contributing to the Institute's Executive Education courses.

Peacetech Alliance Leverages Interdisciplinarity to Build Peace

In March 2023, the Geneva Graduate Institute, EPFL, the United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR) and the Geneva Peacebuilding Platform announced the launch of the PeaceTech Alliance. The Alliance will enable collaboration on a range of Peace-to-Tech and Tech-to-Peace initiatives that contribute to the global peace agenda.

PeaceTech aims to leverage technology to drive peace, while also developing strategies to prevent technology from being used to enable violence. The Alliance will contribute to knowledge-building in the field, with a view to tangible and impactful systemic change at scale. Initiatives will explore the role of science and technology in all processes around peace, as well as how peace studies should influence science and technology.

PeaceTech Alliance initiatives will include joint projects, calls for proposals, expertise-building, education and awareness-raising activities. A first project targeting de-escalation of online polarisation is already underway, led by Professor Karl Aberer of EPFL's Distributed Systems Laboratory. The team is developing AI-based algorithms to counteract online polarisation and offline radicalisation.

Optimising landmine detection and supporting recovery and reconstruction strategies is another priority. Inspired by the Ukraine Recovery Conference in Lugano, this project focuses on protecting both people and the environment.

The Alliance will also build on existing partnerships with the International Committee of the Red Cross to enhance demobilisation and reintegration processes for combatants and civilians, including the advancement of adaptive prosthetics for survivors.

Other work will examine ways to improve monitoring mechanisms for conventional, chemical, biological, nuclear and autonomous weapons, as well as verification processes for AI-based systems and outer space. These efforts align with the Swiss Arms Control and Disarmament Strategy and are relevant to the UN Security Council.

Increasing the Visibility and Promotion of Research Findings

In addition to supporting two academic publications (the history journal *Relations internationales* and *International Development Policy – DevPol*), the Research Office has developed a number of media and communication platforms that have gained a good reputation in recent years. The figures for 2023 are proof of this: for example, the *Research Bulletin*, which presents research news and productions on a monthly basis, attracts 5,800 subscribers (including over 500 journalists). Publications on the OpenEdition platform (*DevPol*, eBooks, ePapers, International, former collections of IUED, Genre & Développement) recorded over 1 million unique visitors last year. Over this period, our webzine *Global Challenges* had over 150,000 page views. Additionally, our partnership with *The Conversation* newspaper has enabled the 78 articles published to date to be viewed more than 304,000 times in 2023,

with a record 99,416 views for Letizia Gaja Pinoja's article on "human zoos" (*Zoos humains: quand des expositions suisses déshumanisaient les Noirs*). Finally, the Institute launched in 2023 the *Geneva Policy Outlook*, designed as a global platform to foster dialogue in Geneva's global policy space. It is indeed crucial for the Geneva Graduate Institute to share the content of research results with as many people as possible, academics and non-academics alike.

NORRAG Becomes the Graduate Institute's 10th Research Centre

In December 2023, the Network for International Policies and Cooperation in Education and Training (NORRAG) became the 10th research centre of the Geneva Graduate Institute as the Global Education Centre. Supported since 1991 by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation, NORRAG counts over 5,600 members active in developing international policies and cooperation in education and training. The new centre is led by Academic Director Chanwoong Baek, UNESCO Co-Chair in Comparative Education Policy and Assistant Professor at the Institute, and by Executive Director Moira V. Faul, Senior Lecturer at the Institute. NORRAG addresses under-researched questions of quality and equity in key issues in education and development, aiming to amplify under-represented expertise particularly from the South.

In 2023, NORRAG was awarded CHF 3.3 million of additional funds by the Global Partnership for Education (GPE) Knowledge and Innovation Exchange (KIX), implemented by the International Development Research Centre (IDRC), for a four-year extension of the KIX Europe, Middle East and North Africa, Asia, and Pacific (EMAP) hub, which seeks to improve policies and practices strengthening national education systems within partner countries.

The proposed project will examine the intersectionally gendered practices of survival in the context of Ukraine. It will document how diverse Ukrainians experience and respond to different but interlinked forms of violence—from the violence of war and Russian invasion to the economic violence unleashed by structural and austerity reforms. Using a feminist political economy lens, the project will examine how the coping strategies are shaped by gender and other intersectional identities, and influenced by national and international policies. The project will adopt a participatory action research approach and will use a combination of fieldwork in two oblasts in Ukraine, policy analysis, and a prefigurative workshop, in order to make

a two-fold contribution. On the one hand, it will provide a concrete illustration of feminist conceptualisations of violence, and a deeper understanding of the place of social reproduction in war and war economy. On the other hand, it will address an urgent practical need for information and analysis that will inform more gender-responsive and feminist policymaking and recovery planning in Ukraine.

Defending Democracy in the European Union: A Socio-Legal Approach to the European Institutions

How have democratic institutions defended themselves against threats from political parties that aim to undermine their very existence? In the European Union (EU), this question has become a pressing issue after some governing parties in its Member States have been accused of dismantling the rule of law at home and threatening the proper functioning of European institutions. This project will investigate how the EU institutions have approached threats to its proper functioning coming from such political parties after the latter entered the Council of the EU or after their representatives were directly elected to the European Parliament. Taking a sociolegal approach, the project will focus on the criteria European institutions use to identify threats to its existence posed by these political parties; which

formal and informal rules European institutions use to sanction them or to keep them at a distance; and lastly, how political parties and governments in EU member states who fear being sanctioned try to convince the EU not to impose sanctions on them. The project will be based on a multi-methods approach that combines interview-based methods, non-participant observation, and archival research in the key EU institutions. The results will enrich political debates on the defence of the rule of law in Europe, as well as on the future of democracies in the twenty-first century.

Mapping the Transnational Circulation and Control of Small Arms in Latin America

Project host: Centre on Conflict, Development and Peacebuilding

How do small arms and light weapons (SALW) circulate in Latin America, between state and non-state actors and between legal and illegal spheres of activity, and what are the cultural and regulatory dynamics that shape this circulation? This project tackles these questions by focusing on military-style automatic rifles. It aims to: (1) understand how the circulation of military-style rifles occurs within and through Latin America; (2) assess their effects on patterns of violence in the region; (3) analyse gun cultures in the region, and (4) identify the main challenges for controlling these flows. The project will adopt a two-layered mixed-methods approach to tackle the transnational circulation and control of military-style rifles

in the region. The first layer gathers quantitative data on rifle flows over the last decade and qualitative data on related socio-cultural and gendered perspectives (e.g., the emergence of gun cultures) as well as on their political economy. The second layer investigates the adoption and implementation of international, regional and national norms on SALW in Latin America and their policy impacts.

From the Bottom Up: Incorporating Vulnerable Groups in the Norm Creation Process Concerning Sea Level Rise and Climate-Induced Displacement in Oceania

The project explores how the norm creation process in international law may be reoriented in order to better respond and react to global issues using tailored and appropriate normative solutions. It takes the case study of climate-induced displacement in Oceania, modelling and analysing the extant participatory mechanisms within that system and exploring their shortcomings. It posits that a failure to include the voices of affected populations in designing solutions runs the risk that our responses are, at best, non-responsive and, at worst, maladaptive in addressing the actual concerns and needs of those groups. It engages with a fundamental element of international law: the role of groups of individuals in the international system. It does so both theoretically, examining who

holds sovereign rights and other rights forming the normative basis for participation, and practically, by engaging in questions of effectiveness and responsiveness of the international system in incorporating those groups. This is important first because those groups have an interest, and in many cases a right, to participation, and, second, because vulnerable populations often possess situated knowledge that cannot be underestimated as an important, informative, and instructional element of an effective response.

The Emerging Regime Complex for Pathogen Genetic Sequence Data (GSD) Sharing Platform Infrastructure

Project Host: Global Health Centre

The sharing of pathogen genetic sequence data (GSD) enables global genomic surveillance and research and development (R&D) of vaccines, diagnostics, and treatments for pandemics. This sharing takes place on digital platforms, subject to platform policies and the principle of open science. However, the rules governing pathogen GSD sharing are soon likely to change, as the topic has been included as part of ongoing international rulemaking processes: the amendment of the International Health Regulations (IHR), negotiation of a new pandemic agreement, publication of the WHO guiding principles for pathogen genome data sharing, the decision to include GSD as part of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework

and the proposal to establish the European Health Data Space (EHDS). The anticipated rules are likely to affect the sharing of GSD and of related benefits and, thus, influence the way we prepare for and respond to future pandemics. By treating the digital platforms as infrastructures, this project seeks to guide practitioners navigating this complex international regime and to contribute to the academic literature on platform regulation and infrastructural approaches to international law.

Cyber Operations, International Humanitarian Law, and Issues of Neutrality

Project host: Centre on Conflict, Development and Peacebuilding
Amount: CHF282,300
Duration: 01.07.2024–30.06.2026

This project is aimed at researching issues related to the application of international humanitarian law (IHL) norms to cyberoperations in situations of international armed conflict. The conflict in Ukraine is a pertinent example of the changing nature of warfare, from conventional means to an increasing number of incidents using new technologies. Cyberoperations pose a unique challenge in international law because of the lack of clear legal regulation of issues related to the cybersphere in international legal acts. Firstly, the project will investigate cyberattacks as a means of warfare taking the Russian aggression against Ukraine as a case study. Secondly, issues related to the application of the law of neutrality to cyberoperations will be explored, addressing whether a neutral country can

assist parties to a conflict in the cybersphere. Thirdly, Russian cyberattacks will be considered from the point of view of war crimes in an international armed conflict. Ultimately, the project will improve our understanding of the international legal aspects of combating cyberattacks, thereby contributing to the ability of states to resist such attacks and protect their critical infrastructure.

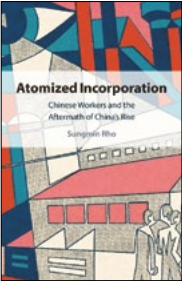

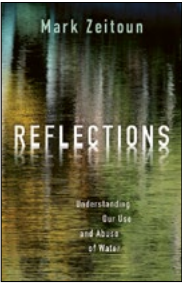

Applied Research

Associated Programmes

BILATERAL ASSISTANCE AND CAPACITY BUILDING FOR CENTRAL BANKS

The Bilateral Assistance and Capacity Building for Central Banks (BCC) programme supports partners’ central banks in emerging and developing countries in building the analytical and technical expertise required for efficient monetary policy conduct. It builds on the Institute’s longstanding expertise in providing technical assistance through missions in the partner countries tailored to their specific needs, supervision of research projects by central banks’ staff, workshops, and an annual conference.

In 2023, the BCC concluded its second five-year phase, and the State Secretariat for Economic Affairs (SECO) renewed its mandate for a third phase. It organised an active series of technical assistance missions (close to 80) in the partners’ central banks, several of which face a challenging environment. A growing share of the missions consist of peer-to-peer assistance among the central banks in the BCC programme, fostering an active network. Four researchers from central banks visited the Institute to work on policy-oriented projects, in addition to seven research projects where researchers at the central banks were steered by senior academics drawn from the BCC network. Interactions between the participating central banks, as well as academics and senior representatives from other policy institutions, were fostered through our annual conference in Geneva on the topic of how to conduct policy in an environment of uneven growth prospects. A workshop was held in Geneva with representatives from the central banks involved in the promotion of continuous learning and skills acquisition.

THE GLOBAL COMMISSION ON DRUG POLICY

The Global Commission on Drug Policy was established in 2011 by political leaders, cultural figures and globally influential personalities to contribute to the world debate on drug policy. Each of its 29 members, in their individual capacity, advocate for an open dialogue on drug-related issues, underlining the negative impact of the current international drug control regime on health, human rights and development.

The Global Commission, through its political strategy and articulation of drug-related matters, combines quiet diplomacy, innovative recommendations and media presence to promote a human rights- and evidence-based approach to drugs. A visible result of this high-level action is the general change in the approach to drugs, with the perception of the “war on drugs” seeing a shift and more people recognising it as having failed.

In 2023, amongst a number of strategic advocacy actions and collaborative activities with its partners, the Global Commission launched a twelfth thematic report titled *HIV, Hepatitis and Drug Policy Reform*.

SMALL ARMS SURVEY

Founded in 1999, the Small Arms Survey provides expertise on all aspects of small arms and armed violence by monitoring and analysing stocks and flows of weapons and ammunition; the impacts of small arms proliferation; and measures and programmes aimed at curbing illicit small arms flows.

In 2023, the Survey provided expert support to or conducted research in countries in Asia, Africa, the Americas and Europe, on topics such as the illicit trafficking and use of small arms – including improvised and artisanal weapons and ammunition – as well as on urgent crises, such as those in Afghanistan, Ukraine and Sudan. It also collaborated with regional organisations around the world to address the supranational dimensions of small arms trafficking and armed violence.

The Survey continued to play an important role in supporting the implementation of multilateral small arms frameworks, such as the UN Programme of Action, the Arms Trade Treaty, the Firearms Protocol, and the recently adopted Global Framework for Through-life Conventional Ammunition Management.

The Survey offers expert, technical support to countries and regional organisations through conducting assessments, facilitating and advising policy development, fostering sharing of experiences and learning, and providing tailored capacity-building modules on weapons and ammunition management. It is also a leading voice on the integration of a gender perspective in small arms control.

Les plateformes

Situé au cœur de la Genève internationale, un haut lieu de la gouvernance mondiale, l’Institut mobilise l’excellence scientifique, la transdisciplinarité et la transthématicité pour favoriser la pensée critique et créative sur les grands défis de notre temps. Outre la formation de nouvelles générations de décideurs et décideuses engagées et responsables dans un monde radicalement incertain, l’Institut contribue activement aux discussions prospectives autour des grands enjeux de ce monde et sur le futur du multilatéralisme à travers l’organisation de conférences, de débats et d’autres initiatives ayant pour objectif de renforcer les échanges et les synergies entre les acteurs de la Genève internationale, mais également entre organisations internationales, organisations non gouvernementales, gouvernements et milieux du secteur privé.

Ainsi, l’Institut est impliqué dans huit des dix-sept plateformes de coopération soutenues par la Suisse dans le cadre de la politique d’État hôte. Ses centres de recherche accueillent quatre plateformes : la Geneva Peacebuilding Platform, la Geneva Trade Platform, la Thinking Ahead on Societal Change Platform (TASC) et la International Geneva Global Health Platform. En outre, l’Institut participe à quatre autres plateformes : la Geneva Science-Policy Interface, la Geneva Human Rights Platform hébergée par la Geneva Academy (un centre conjoint avec l’Université de Genève), le Geneva Water Hub et les International Gender Champions.

Geneva Trade Platform

The Geneva Trade Platform (GTP) supports, informs, and translates the world of international trade policy to a global audience. It convenes meetings; curates, commissions and promotes research; incubates promising projects and delivers capacity building, all to strengthen the trade policy conversation and ensure it leaves no voice unheard.

The Platform combines the convening power, prestige, world-leading experts, engaged student body, and resources of the Geneva Graduate Institute with an agile framework, the support of donors, and the collaboration of partners from across the public, private, non-profit and intergovernmental sectors.

The high-level meetings, networking events, inclusive research and robust communications of the Platform showcase the best of the Institute while providing students with opportunities to engage directly with policymakers, business leaders, intergovernmental organisations and international trade governance.

Ces plateformes réunissent des parties prenantes des secteurs public et privé, de la société civile et du monde académique en vue de favoriser la réflexion et l’action communes dans des domaines thématiques clés comme le commerce, la finance, l’environnement, la santé, l’éducation et la construction de la paix. Une activité spécifique des plateformes est l’organisation de grands rassemblements parmi lesquels les Geneva Peace Week, Geneva Health Week, Geneva Human Rights Week, Geneva Trade Week, Geneva Democracy Week et le Future of Work Summit. Ces manifestations offrent une opportunité inégalée de stimuler les échanges interthématiques, intersectoriels, interdisciplinaires et intergénérationnels. En ouvrant des espaces de réflexion et d’échanges structurés, les plateformes et leurs événements permettent de créer du lien entre Genève, les autres centres de gouvernance mondiale et les expériences du terrain.

Throughout 2023, the GTP hosted a range of events of events, including Geneva Trade Week, a conference on sustainable investment promotion, a seminar series on major intergovernmental reports, and numerous networking, student empowerment, and policy dialogue opportunities. It delivered direct capacity-building programmes to trade officials from South Korea and female trade experts from across Africa, continued to provide hosting and support to the TESS Forum, and launched the *International Trade Law E-Casebook* to drastically reduce the price of studying trade law.

TESS – Forum on Trade, Environment, and the SDGs

The Forum on Trade, Environment and the SDGs (TESS) – housed within the Institute’s Geneva Trade Platform – promotes inclusive cooperation and action in favour of a trading system that effectively addresses global environmental crises and advances the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

In 2023, TESS continued to support the inclusive international cooperation and policy action necessary to align trade and trade policies with the urgent need for environmental action, sustainable development, and just transitions. Amongst other achievements, TESS produced a report authored by an international legal expert group offering guidance on the design and implementation of trade-related climate measures and policies, supported the work of the High Ambition Coalition to End Plastic Pollution in the UN-led plastics treaty negotiations, and contributed to discussions across the WTO on the achievement of concrete sustainability outcomes at the next ministerial conference. TESS also helped build the political support that led to the successful launch of the Coalition of Trade Ministers on Climate, mobilised stakeholders on the trade dimensions of circular economy, and convened discussions on fostering access to environmental technologies in developing countries.

Thinking Ahead on Societal Change – The TASC Platform

The Thinking Ahead on Societal Change (TASC) Platform is an open forum where policymakers, businesses, researchers, and civil society can come together to tackle some of the biggest universal challenges of the future. By providing a place for people to share perspectives, connect visions, and develop new solutions, the TASC Platform brings the unknowns of the future into focus and acts on them today.

As an independent body supported by the Government of Switzerland and embedded in the Institute, the TASC Platform leverages the latest thinking in the academic world and embraces a culture of openness, critical thinking and global cooperation. It has stepped in where there was a void by creating an open, informal space for a multistakeholder, multidisciplinary community connected by its interest in applying collective intelligence and innovation to shape a fair and inclusive future of work.

In 2023, the TASC Platform continued to grow its audience and engagement on subjects related to the Future of Work – hosting 32 collaborative events with contributions from over 174 organisations; connecting a virtual community of over 1,000 members and subscribers; and supporting eight innovative collaboration and research projects, notably partnering with the International Labour Organization and the World Economic Forum. The TASC Platform also dedicated its time towards supporting forward-looking discussions on issues that are central to the multilateral agenda, as well as some that are more novel for International Geneva.

The Geneva Peacebuilding Platform

The Geneva Peacebuilding Platform is a joint initiative mandated by five partner institutions with rich and diversified peacebuilding-related experience, including the Geneva Graduate Institute's Centre on Conflict, Development and Peacebuilding (CCDP), the Geneva Centre for Security Policy (GCSP), the Geneva Centre for Security Sector Governance (DCAF), Interpeace, Principles for Peace (P4P), and the Quaker United Nations Office in Geneva (QUNO). The Platform is housed and financially administered by the CCDP and is primarily funded by the Swiss Federal Department of Foreign Affairs.

The Platform acts as a vector of connections by opening and strengthening spaces fostering peacebuilding priorities. Through its network mobilisation capabilities, the Platform ensures the continuous exchange of information for better peacebuilding practice with seminars, consultations and conferences, and facilitates multistakeholder processes and outcomes-oriented dialogues.

Through its partners' membership and Advisory Board constituency – involving a network comprising close to 4,000 peacebuilding professionals working on building peace together – the Platform provides for strategic advice and foresight on core peacebuilding issues, relevant to the broad international agenda. As an international expertise hub on peacebuilding, the Platform identifies, briefs and shares knowledge by way of policy applicable briefings on critical, relevant thematic, including, but not limited to, conflict prevention, conflict analysis, mediation, security, peace processes and accountability.

International Geneva Global Health Platform

Throughout the years, the Global Health Centre (GHC) has positioned its activities within the context of International Geneva with the aim of strengthening the city as a "global health capital". In this context, the GHC signed a multiyear contract with the Swiss Federal Department of Foreign Affairs (FDFA) to strengthen Geneva as a hub of global health. Through its International Geneva Global Health Platform (the Platform), the GHC engages with a wide range of institutions and acts as a laboratory of global health innovation. From 2014 to 2023, the Platform encouraged a vast number of global health actors to work together on topics of common concern, and built cross-sectoral synergies. The Platform has established itself as a host for policy dialogues, roundtables, research seminars, and other public and closed-door events.

In 2023, the Platform co-organised 23 events, of which 14 were public – hybrid or online – panel discussions, and 9 were closed-door. The Platform also co-sponsored a number

In March 2023, the Geneva Peacebuilding Platform facilitated a consultative discussion involving Geneva-based international organisations, civil society, the private sector, and academia on the upcoming Summit of the Future in 2024 and the New Agenda for Peace. Additionally, the Platform organised a training on sustaining peace for state missions in October 2023. Celebrating the 10-year anniversary of Geneva Peace Week in October 2023, the Maison de la paix hosted a diverse forum with 61 events, attracting 5,500 attendees from 155 countries and featuring 167 partners and 222 speakers. This momentum continued with the "Geneva Peace Week Meets New York" event in November 2023, gathering peacebuilders to discuss proposals for the New Agenda for Peace and its implementation, with over 100 on-site participants per session and 300 online attendees, marking a successful first edition and enhancing celebrations for the 10th anniversary of Geneva Peace Week. The Platform also contributed to COP28 in December 2023 through its Community of Practice on Environment, Climate, Conflict and Peace, alongside its communities of practice on Business and Conflict and on Technology and Peace.

In 2023, the GHC decided to reactivate its free course on global health diplomacy through the Platform according to its capacity-building mandate. The Platform organised two sessions in July and November, the latter in collaboration with Unitaid.

In early 2023, the Platform also launched its own independent website www.ghplatform.org, showcasing all of its activities as well as a repository for job openings from Geneva-based global health actors.

Executive Education Continues Its Strategic Growth and Repositioning

The Geneva Graduate Institute's Executive Education Programme seeks to offer the most up-to-date knowledge and skills to participants enabling them to become capacitated actors of international affairs. In 2023, the programme pursued further implementation of the strategic growth and repositioning it had initiated in 2022, following the introduction of an Executive Master in International Relations, short courses and the establishment of partnerships. During this most recent period, the programme focused its activity primarily on three fronts: the thematic enrichment of its portfolio, a geographic expansion of courses and the widening of its customised offer.

Firstly, in the context of a succession of international crises highlighting the importance of diplomacy as a pillar of international affairs, the Executive Education Programme launched in September 2023 a new degree-granting four-module programme on "Diplomacy, Negotiation and Policy". This course, which uses applied learning approaches blended with real-world case studies, foresight workshops and simulation practice, offers participants a deep dive into national, regional, and international diplomatic policy spheres. In particular, it allows graduates to experiment with innovative tools to sharpen negotiation and mediation skills in complex geopolitical situations. This course is also accompanied by a new Executive Education Upskill Series offering strategic assets for scientific diplomacy, digital technologies, and anticipation (both scientific and diplomatic).

Secondly, in the continuity of its global outlook and existing international presence, the Executive Education Programme launched a new "Gender and Development" course designed for Latin America along with two workshops and the publication of two manuals. In parallel, programmes in sub-Saharan Africa and the Middle East remained strong. The Certificate of Advanced Studies in Gender and Development delivered in West Africa was expanded on with the addition of a programme for the Great Lakes region – courses cotaught with 14 African lecturers and building on partnerships with local scholars and civil society. In the Middle East, the Development

Policies and Practices – Conflict and Fragility Management Programme contributed further to the capacity-building training of civil servants and professionals in Qatar and regionally, in partnership with the Hamad Bin Khalifa University and securing 15 new fellowships in addition to 20 existing ones from the Qatar Fund for Development.

Finally, a number of customised programmes were held with a variety of institutional and private partners. These included governments (the foreign ministries of Switzerland, Canada and the Netherlands); international organisations (World Health Organisation and the United Nations Refugee Agency); and private corporations (Coca Cola, HBC Suisse).

The addition of a new course on diplomacy, expansion to Latin America and diversified customised programme offering allowed the Executive Education programme in 2023 to continue forging ahead strongly in the enrichment of its portfolio and its educational mission – a mission also geared towards meeting the needs of executives willing to develop competencies to advance their careers.

It uses an applied learning approach with real-world case studies, foresight projects, policy papers, simulation practice and networking.

10th Anniversary of the LLM in International Law

In March 2023, Executive Education celebrated the 10-year anniversary of its Master of Law (LLM) in International Law, which was established to complement the Institute's offering of competitive international law courses. Over the past decade, the Institute's LLM programme has become one of the top degree-granting courses in international law globally, consistently ranking in the top five of best LLMs in international law programmes in the world. Distinctive features of the course include the combination of theoretical and practical training, the student-faculty ratio, the diversity of faculty on the course, the combination of a solid general foundation in international law and specialisation in one of three concentration streams: protection of the individual, international economic law, and international environmental law. Legal clinics are a central

component of the LLM programme. In 2023, LLM participants' projects included a project with Trial International in which students researched the domestic legal venues for accountability for international crimes committed by private military and security companies; and a project with the Center for International Environmental Law (CIEL) in which students explored legal arguments on geoengineering in the context of climate change.

ALAIN BERSET, PRESIDENT OF THE SWISS CONFEDERATION, SPEAKS AT THE INSTITUTE

The Geneva Graduate Institute had the pleasure of welcoming the President of the Swiss Confederation **Alain Berset** for a public conference entitled “What Role for Switzerland in a World in Crisis?” on 28 February 2023. This discussion was moderated by Marie-Laure Salles, Director, and two students of the Institute, Aurélie Hutzli, member of the Junior Diplomat Initiative, and Iris Raith, member of TEDxGVAGrad.

2023–2024 ACADEMIC YEAR OPENING LECTURE: “WAR AND PEACE IN THE 21ST CENTURY”

The Geneva Graduate Institute had the honour of welcoming **Ghassan Salamé**, Professor of International Relations Emeritus at Sciences Po Paris and former UNSG Special Representative in Libya, for the opening lecture of its academic year on 5 October 2023.

As we navigate an increasingly fragmented and challenged world, Director **Marie-Laure Salles** stressed in her welcome remarks that “Peace is an utopia... but one that should always guide us. It is not enough for peace to be established, we know that it must also be constantly sustained, and fought for on a daily basis.”

Three decades ago, wars opposing major powers had become unthinkable courtesy of assured mutual deterrence bringing a sense of optimism within the international community.

A worldwide process of democratisation coupled with rapidly increasing economic interdependence and a global agenda seemed to make Immanuel Kant’s dream of universal peace true. Nonetheless, as stated by Ghassan Salamé, “universalisation is differentiation”. Instead of the expected convergences, concepts such as democracy, capitalism and peace were used in very selective ways by the newly converted.

GENEVA PEACE WEEK EVERYTHING IN OUR POWER FOR PEACE: FILIPPO GRANDI GIVES THE KOFI ANNAN PEACE ADDRESS

On 3 November 2023, the Geneva Graduate Institute hosted the Kofi Annan Peace Address given by **Filippo Grandi**, the 11th United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees. The Address was organised in partnership with the Kofi Annan Foundation and the Geneva Peacebuilding Platform as the closing event of the tenth annual Geneva Peace Week.

Kofi Annan and his principle that “peace must be sought, above all, because it is the condition for every member of the human family to live a life of dignity and security” was at the heart of his eponymous Peace Address, with all speakers paying tribute to the former UN Secretary General. 2023 marks the fifth anniversary of Kofi Annan’s passing.

Alain Berset and his team did us the honour of visiting the Institute again on 20 June, for closed-doors discussions with some of our faculty members on global inequalities, the need to reinvent multilateralism and the role of Switzerland, and more specifically International Geneva, in a rapidly changing world.

The reappearance of conflicts that once seemed like isolated anomalies has now returned with a resounding intensity.

We know a new international system is in the making, but the confused signals of the recent past strongly blur the traits of the still-to-crystallise system. Multilateralism is in poor shape, declared Ghassan Salamé, but we still need more multilateralism. We need to be vigilant and fight within our own countries for better governance, helping us to look for better multilateralism.

Marie-Laure Salles underlined that there is no better place “to affirm the urgent and constant fight and commitment for multidimensional peace than right here in Switzerland, in Geneva, in the Maison de la paix”.

This opening lecture was introduced by **Anne Hiltbold**, State Councillor of the Department of Public Education, Training and Youth Affairs, and moderated by **Mohamed Mahmoud Mohamedou**, Deputy Director and Professor of International History and Politics at the Geneva Graduate Institute.

The Peace Address was opened by **Marie-Laure Salles**, Director of the Institute, who called on the importance of hope in our current climate, and noted that “peace is a project, an eternal one. And a project that calls for courage and integrity. Peace has to be established. But we know that it must also be constantly re-established, sustained, and fought for on a daily basis.”

The event featured a special performance by **Barbara Hendricks**, celebrated soprano, human rights activist, and UNHCR Honorary Lifetime Goodwill Ambassador.

Filippo Grandi opened his keynote lecture with the powerful statement that “we live – again – in a time of war”, noting the polarisation that rules the current global climate. He emphasised the necessity of Geneva Peace Week and reminded us of Kofi Annan’s belief that we must all contribute to peace in our own way.

The High Commissioner presented four key pieces of “food for thought” during his lecture: the need to keep humanitarian action around the world as strong as possible while peace is failing; the importance of ensuring flexibility for humanitarian responses, especially in the most challenging situations where humanitarians are the only ones on the ground; the crucial need to nurture resilience and invest much more in emergency peacebuilding; and the need for the international community to reboot principles of law and humanity.

As conflicts around the world are growing and agreement between international parties becoming harder to reach, international law is “increasingly being violated without any consequence for the violators, but with the gravest of consequences for civilians”. Filippo Grandi suggested that this latter issue be approached with both a hardware solution – a call for political leaders and governments to respect international law and human rights – and a software solution, with a call to everyone to nurture respect for others with care, compassion, and solidarity.

“For it is upon those foundations [of respect, care, compassion, and solidarity with humankind] – those values and the ways with which we, as individuals, carry ourselves – that peace, real peace, even an imperfect peace, can be built.”

THE GENEVA CHALLENGE CELEBRATES ITS 10TH ANNIVERSARY

In 2014, the Geneva Graduate Institute launched the Advancing Development Goals Contest, known as the Geneva Challenge, thanks to the vision and generosity of Ambassador Jenö Staehelin and the patronage of the late Kofi Annan.

The Geneva Challenge brings together graduate students from diverse disciplinary and contextual perspectives to provide innovative and pragmatic solutions to some of the world's complex challenges. It aims to stimulate interdisciplinary problem solving and analysis on development, and encourages master students from around the world to bridge the gap between their studies and real development policy.

In a world riven by geopolitical tensions, and with our common future hanging in the balance, it is undeniable that we need to aim for systemic and long-term sustainability.

2023 was a special edition for the Geneva Challenge as it celebrated its 10th anniversary. For the last ten years, the Geneva Challenge has aimed to empower students worldwide to engage in thinking, daring, dreaming and imagining sustainable futures and solutions. It has brought together over 10,000 graduate students over the past decade, divided into more than 2,100 teams, from more than 200 universities and representing more than 100 nationalities from all regions of the world.

For the 2023 edition, teams of graduate students submitted creative and innovative projects to address the complex and multifaceted challenges of loneliness. As underlined by **Michael Møller**, Chair of the Geneva Challenge Jury and former Director-General of the United Nations Office at Geneva, loneliness is an under-appreciated global public health threat that needs urgent and sustained attention. In his keynote address during the award ceremony, **Professor Abhijit Banerjee**, corecipient of the 2019 Nobel Memorial Prize in Economic Sciences, stressed that the experience of loneliness is prevalent in all societies around the world, among people from all socioeconomic backgrounds, ages, and genders, affecting every facet of health, wellbeing and development.

The first prize was awarded to Team Latin America for their ground-breaking project entitled “Historias Con Punche”, a meticulously crafted initiative aimed at reducing loneliness through participatory arts among Peruvian elderly people in Villa El Salvador. The project sheds light on ways of improving emotional and mental well-being, promoting lifelong learning, preserving cultural heritage, and creating friendly communities that are both strong and inclusive, employing artistic methods that are easily transferable and sustainable.

In his concluding words, Michael Møller announced the theme for the 2024 edition of the Geneva Challenge, which will be on the challenges of youth empowerment. In the light of the rising global youth population and its vital role in achieving the Sustainable Development Goals, the landscape of youth engagement and empowerment is complex, grappling with numerous and multifaceted challenges in the forms of disparities, inaccessibility, and exclusion worldwide. Nevertheless, Michael Møller stressed that it is imperative that we all understand that only integrated, collaborative, networked and preventive approaches will allow us to ensure a sustainable and healthy environment for the generations to come. Through this new edition, which was formally launched at the beginning of 2024, the Geneva Challenge encourages the youth to seek meaningful partnerships in their collective pursuit of impactful and lasting solutions.

DOCUMENTARY “THE PRICE OF TRUTH”

On 13 October, the last evening of the 2023 edition of Democracy Week, the Geneva Graduate Institute, the Kofi Annan Foundation and the Freedom Cartoonists Foundation hosted a screening of the documentary *The Price of Truth* about the life of **Dmitry Muratov** in front of a packed auditorium and Muratov himself.

Russian journalist, television presenter, and the editor-in-chief of the Russian newspaper *Novaya Gazeta*, Dmitry Muratov was awarded the 2021 Nobel Peace Prize jointly with Maria Ressa for “their efforts to safeguard freedom of expression, which is a precondition for democracy and lasting peace”. On 1 September 2023, the Russian authorities declared Dmitry Muratov to be a “foreign agent”.

The cosponsors of the event delivered institutional welcomes. **Corinne Momal-Vanian**, Executive Director of the Kofi Annan Foundation, noted that while there is a “retreat of democracy” worldwide, many are still willing to stand up for it. **Patrick Chappatte**, President of the Freedom Cartoonists Foundation, thanked Dmitry Muratov for being a “voice of conscience” in this world. **Antonio Rodgers**, President of the State Council, Republic and State of Geneva, said democracy must be protected globally as well as in Switzerland where it must also be “nurtured”.

TECH WEEK 2023

Tech Week is a dynamic and immersive experience designed to engage the Geneva Graduate Institute community in thought-provoking discussions, interactive workshops, and activities aimed at raising community awareness of digital responsibility and training in good cybersecurity practices. The December 2023 Tech Week featured two tech-focused episodes of the Institute's *What Matters Today* podcast series. The initial episode delves into “Responsible Digital Technology” with insights from **Jérôme Duberry**, **Johan Den Arend**, and Canopé founder, **Ivan Mariblanca Flinch**. The second episode, “Think like a Hacker with Cyberpeace”, featured a dynamic conversation between **Jérôme Duberry** and **Adrien Ogee** from the CyberPeace Institute.

Highlights from the week included “Beyond Code: The Battle for Influence in AI's Global Rulebook”, unpacking the complexities of AI governance and exploring the power play that will determine the future trajectory of AI's global impact, as well as the screening of the film *Backlash: Misogyny in the Digital Age*, a shocking story of four women leaders whose lives are overturned by cyberviolence.

Finally, a digital detox was organised to foster meaningful connections by stepping away from technology for an hour a day.

L’Institut est une fondation de droit privé dotée d’une gouvernance forte qui poursuit l’objectif prioritaire de l’excellence universitaire en prenant appui sur deux types de moyens : d’une part, un soutien public sous la forme de subventions de la Confédération helvétique et du canton de Genève qui lui donnent la base indispensable à l’accomplissement de sa mission et, d’autre part, des financements du secteur non étatique sous la forme de dons qui lui permettent de se développer.

L’Institut recherche l’efficacité dans la mise en œuvre des deux types de moyens. Dans la réalisation du mandat qui lui est confié par les autorités politiques, il fait levier sur les moyens publics pour obtenir, notamment en recrutant des professeurs et professeurs de haut niveau, autant de fonds de tiers que possible, principalement sous la forme de contrats de recherche et de revenus de la formation continue. Il recherche simultanément des ressources additionnelles auprès de fondations et de mécènes pour financer des bourses et des chaires.

The Institute, a private law foundation with a solid governance structure, pursues its goal of academic excellence through two means: public support in the form of subsidies from the Swiss Confederation and the Canton of Geneva provide an essential base for achieving its mission, while funding from the non-state sector in the form of donations allows the Institute to grow.

The Institute seeks to implement efficiently both of these means. In carrying out the mandate entrusted to it by political authorities, it leverages public resources to obtain (notably through recruiting high-level professors) as much third-party funding as possible, mainly via research grants and executive education income. Simultaneously, it seeks additional funding for scholarships and academic chairs from foundations and patrons, which enhances the Institute’s appeal to students from around the world while generating additional income.
